


Student Transfer Report

Spring 2009- Spring 2013 Analysis


FCC regularly collects data from the National Student Clearinghouse on its students who have transferred to higher education institutions nationwide. Examination across semesters for the period from Spring 2009 through Spring 2013 showed that **4,197** students transferred to either a Maryland (approximately 71%) or an out-of-state institution (approximately 29%). Specifically, 59% (n =2458) of students transferred to Maryland four-year institutions, 13% (n = 534) transferred to Maryland two-year institutions, 24% (n =1003) transferred to out-of-state four-year institutions, and approximately 5% (n =200) transferred to out-of-state two-year institutions (see Figure 1). One student transferred to out of state technical institutions. Approximately 82% of FCC's transfer students moved on to a four-year educational institution. **Several institutions and students restricted gender and race data (n-86). These students are included in the total transfer count but not in the gender and race data at the end of the report.**



Transfers to Maryland Institutions: Approximately 71% (n= 2,992) of FCC's students transferred to Maryland institutions from Spring 2009 through Spring 2013. The following table shows the number of students that transferred to two and four-year institutions in Maryland during this period (See Table 1). **Hood College, Univ. of MD College Park, Towson University, Univ. of MD University College, and Mount Saint Mary's University** attracted the most FCC transfer students.



Transfers to Out-of-State Institutions: From Spring 2009 through Spring 2013, approximately 29% (N= 1,205) of transfer students transferred to out-of-state institutions (see F1 above). During this period, the top ten states to which these students transferred were West Virginia (25%, N=304), Pennsylvania (16%, N=192), Virginia (15%, N=180), North Carolina (5%, N=64), Florida (4%, N=49), District of Columbia (4%, N=45), New York (3%, N=39), South Carolina (3%, N=36), and Texas (2%, N=22), Massachusetts (2%, N=19).




Other transfer destinations made up approximately 21% of Out of State Transfer Destinations (n=1205).

Transfer Trend by Semester: F3 & T2 show FCC’s transfer trends by semester from Spring 2009 through Spring 2013. FCC students tend to transfer and enroll in Maryland institutions during the fall semesters. Out-of-State transfers decrease during the spring. In fall semesters, **an average of 290 FCC students** transferred to a new institution. During the spring **an average of 867 FCC students** transferred to a new institution.



Reminder: Several institutions and students restricted gender and race data (n=86). These students are included in the total transfer count but not in all the gender and race data.




Gender: There were 2,395 (57%) female and 1,710 (41%) male students that transferred to Maryland and Out-of-State institutions from Spring 2009 through Spring 2013. The rate of transfer and enrollment at FCC by gender is similar. Among females, 73% (n = 1725) transferred to Maryland institutions and 27% (n = 670) transferred to out-of-state institutions. Among males, 69% (n = 1,192) transferred to Maryland institutions and 31% (n = 518) transferred to out-of-state institutions (see F4 above).



****Note:** Decimals were not rounded up for this figure to help compare FCC Race/Ethnicity percentage.

Race/Ethnicity: Examination of transfer students by ethnicity showed that most transfers were Caucasian (77%, n = 3212) followed by African Americans (10%, n = 438), Hispanics (4%, n = 177), Asians (4%, n = 156), Native Americans (0.4%, n = 18), and Other/Not Specified 3%, n = 114). White students make up a greater percentage of transfer students than they make up in overall FCC enrollment.



Transfer to Institutions based on Race/Ethnicity: F6 shows the percentage of each ethnic group transferred to Maryland or Out-of-State Institutions from Spring 2009 to Spring 2013. The data shows that for each ethnic group, a consistently larger percent of students transferred to MD institutions than to Out-of-State institutions. Native American Students are the most likely to transfer to an Out of State Institution.
