

The Program

You may have known you wanted to be in law enforcement since grade school. Maybe you want to follow in the steps of family members to continue a tradition of police officers in your family. Or maybe you want to change jobs, start a new career. At FCC, you can identify the best path—police or detective work, governmental agency, parole or corrections—that will allow you to utilize your skills and pursue your interests.

Frederick Community College offers the:

• Associate of Arts degree in criminal justice for students interested in transferring to a four-year college to pursue a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. FCC has transfer agreements with Frostburg University, Mount St. Mary's University and UMUC, where many of our graduates choose to complete their bachelor's degree. • Certificate in Corrections – a program designed to help correctional officers improve work-related skills and advance within criminal justice careers.

On the Job

Criminal justice associate's degree graduates pursue careers in law enforcement and corrections. Bachelor's degree graduates can work as probation and parole agents, federal law enforcement officers and in juvenile services.

Growth Potential and Estimated Salaries

Openings in police services jobs are expected to grow faster than the average for all occupations. Police and sheriff's patrol officers can earn a starting salary of around \$30,000 in the Frederick area. State police positions begin in the mid \$40,000 range, as do jobs with local and federal governments. Overtime is expected in this field and can significantly increase annual salaries. Protective services and corrections jobs are expected to grow at the same rate as the average occupation. Entry-level positions in this area average from \$26,000-\$38,000 annually.
