

Structured Remote Courses (SR)

In-Person Courses

ACR614 Beginner Pen and Ink Drawing

3 sessions, 4.5 hours | **16+** |

Learn how to use pen and ink to create drawings. Explore different techniques and understand that different drawing tips, or nibs, create a variety of effects. Tips and suggestions will be provided. Learn how to build a human face and head using a few simple tools including a pencil, drawing paper, eraser, and pencil sharpener. Using basic shapes and the face mapping method, described by artist and author, Pam Carriker, students will build an accurate sketch of the human head/face. The inclusion of shading will help to create the illusion of three-dimensional forms. This course is designed for students with previous drawing experience. All supplies are included.

ACR181 Drawing and Painting: A Mixed Media Survey Course

5 sessions, 10 hours | **16+** | **4**

This class will take you on a survey journey into an exploration of different art media, introducing you to pencil, watercolor, acrylic, collage, and pastel. Some of the projects may include mixed media techniques, such as combining watercolor, crayon and paper collage, while others will focus on just one media, such as acrylic painting. The projects are inspired by a wide range of artists such as Claude Monet, Gustave Klimt, and Paul Klee. These assignments can be used as jumping off points for your own inspiration, using your own photos, book illustrations, or magazine photos to create your own composition. Or you can use the art demonstrations as a guide to help you feel more comfortable with the specific media. This is a class for those who want to study a variety of subjects, such as landscapes, and still life. This course is a skills-based course meant for beginners and those with some skills. Whether or not you complete an entire project during the class will depend on your level of skill. A supply list will be provided to the students at least one week prior to the start of the course. Supplies costs may vary but could average \$100/student.

Oil paintings remain wet for several days, allowing you to make adjustments and corrections at your own pace. And oil paints have been reformulated to mix with water, so you do not need to work with harmful solvents. Clean-up is much easier. This course will focus on exploring fundamental oil painting techniques and ideas within the context of landscapes. This course is a skills-based course meant for beginners and those with some skills. Whether or not you complete an entire project during the class will depend on your level of skill. A supply list will be provided to the students at least one week prior to the start of the course. Supplies costs may vary but could average \$100/student.


ACR187 Continuing Pastels with Landscapes


5 sessions, 15 hours | 16+



ILR378 Palestine and Israel, Twice-Promised Land: An Exploration Through Film

5 sessions, 12.5 hours | **55+**

This course provides a rare opportunity to examine one of the most important and contentious issues of our time.

For more than seven decades, the Palestine-Israel conflict, the "most fundamental fault line in the Middle East," has stood at the epicenter of political debate in the region and beyond. The 2020 "deal of the century" notwithstanding, peace continues to elude the Holy Land. The persistent failure to resolve the competing visions held by the inhabitants of a land that is sacred to three great religious traditions is a tragedy of the modern age, not only for Arabs and Jews, but also for international stability. This conflict has become a lightning rod, a measure by which the efficacy of public policy and respect for international law are measured and evaluated.

This course will explore the historic roots of this intractable issue, untangle the deeply held convictions of protagonists on both sides, examine popular misconceptions, analyze the effects of policies that impact the inhabitants of the Holy Land, and consider the role of the United States in the Middle East as it relates to this conflict, including the influence of Christian Zionism in American foreign policy.

Located along the most important geopolitical axis in the world and blessed with extensive hydrocarbon resources, the countries of the GCC are critical to the global economy.

Their dramatic transformation to modernity in less than three generations is unparalleled in modern history. While the economies of these traditional societies have soared, so, too, have the challenges that accompany staggering affluence, rapid globalization, and increased international scrutiny.

Among topics discussed will be the role of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia vis-à-vis its neighbors, including its costly and prolonged entanglement in Yemen, its unique relationship with the UAE, and its rapprochement with Qatar. Of special interest is the diminution of the role of the United States vis-à-vis the countries of the GCC as growing Chinese and Russian influence continue to challenge historic assumptions between America and its major partners in the region.

Richard Bucke coined the term cosmic consciousness in the late 1800s and another early researcher, JB Rhine, set up an institute and coined the term extrasensory perception. Today, research is more common. Raymond Moody published his study of near-death experiences in his 1970s book Life After Life. In recent years, several organizations have been set up to study and understand these and other spiritual phenomena. This course will examine some of the enclaves of spiritual experiences including mysticism, angels, Marian apparitions, near death experiences, the paranormal, communication with the dead, and apparitions. The emphasis will be on understanding experiences and finding common characteristics. This is not a class about beliefs or dogma. We will discuss recent research and the various organizations devoted to studying this dimension.

Dr. Karen Gray Memorial

Important Notes

- Out-of-County students (residing outside of Frederick County) are charged an additional \$5 fee per class. Out-of-State students (residing outside of Maryland) are charged a \$10 fee per class.
- A \$9 one-time-per-year, non-refundable registration fee is due at the time
 of registration. This fee is only refundable when FCC cancels a class
 for which the student paid the registration fee and the student has not
 enrolled in any other classes during the period.
- The Tuition Waiver for Adults age 60+ is exclusive to Maryland residents for select classes.

Class Refund Policy

Class Cancellations Initiated by the College. All students will be refunded 100% of class tuition and fees if a class is cancelled by the College.

Drop/Refund Request within Refund Period

Students who chose to drop a CEWD class will receive a full refund provided that they initiate the drop at least two (2) work days prior to the class start date. Other classes with a different full refund period will be noted in the shopping cart upon check-out. The class refund policy is also provided in the registration confirmation email.

Students have two methods to drop a class:

- Log into https://frederick.edu/QuickEnroll and following the directions under How to Drop a Class on the Payments & Refund page. Self-drops are available up to seven (7) days prior to the class start date.
- Email CEInfo@frederick.edu any time prior to the refund deadline. The drop/refund request must be initiated from the email address associated with the student's account.

Refund Request Outside of Refund Period

Students seeking a drop/refund for a class outside the refund period can initiate the request for extenuating circumstances by completing the Drop/Refund Request Form at www.frederick.edu/CEWDRefund. Students will be asked to provide documentation supporting the student's request. Appropriate documentation may include electronic or hard-copy documents from medical providers, employers, child care providers, or others that can validate extenuating circumstances. The college reserves the right to approve a full, partial, or deny a refund request submitted outside the full period for the class.

Approved Refunds

Where possible refunds will be generated back to the original form of payment. Cash and money order payments will be refunded by check and mailed to the address on file. Please allow 10-14 business days to receive refunds.

Registration Fee

The annual registration fee of \$9 is only refundable when FCC cancels a course.

Age Requirements

Students should be at least 16 years of age to enroll in most continuing education courses, except for those courses specifically designated for younger students. Students under the age of 16 who have completed at least the seventh grade may be permitted to enroll on a case-by-case basis. Students will be considered for such admission if they demonstrate the ability to profit from instruction based on a set of specific criteria. For more information, call the counseling office (301.846.2471). Certain programs or courses of study include higher minimum age for participation when the College has determined that age is a factor necessary to the normal operation of the program or activity. Minimum age is used as a measure of approximation of the level of maturity, judgment, and social independence needed for successful participation in the program or activity in addition to academic skills. [Authority:34 CFR 110.12]

College Policies & Procedures

Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

FERPA, commonly known as the Buckley Amendment, was issued by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the 1976 Federal Register. The regulations were transferred to the Department of Education when it was established and codified in Part 99 of Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

The purpose of FERPA is to afford certain rights to students concerning their educational records. FERPA applies to all schools that receive funding under most programs administered by the Secretary of Education. Most post-secondary institutions, both public and private, generally receive such funding and must, therefore, comply with FERPA. FERPA applies to all education records maintained by a post-secondary institution, or by any party acting for the institution, which are directly related to the student. These include but are not limited to assessment test scores, academic standing, rosters, class schedule, or any information must contact the Enrollment Center (located on the first floor of Jefferson Hall) in writing with their request. 


